

Weingut Max Ferd. Richter

PROFILE

The estate of Max Ferd. Richter has been passed down from father to son for the past 300 years. The current reins are held by Dr. Dirk Richter, the 9th generation, and will eventually be passed down to his son Constantin. The estate produces world-class Rieslings from some of the most esteemed vineyards in the Mosel, and all production comes from estate holdings. Through the entire line of wines, their hallmark balance is evident in every glass.

Throughout the estate, only all-natural fertilizers, sustainable farming, and hand-harvesting are employed. Vineyards are treated as needed so in some vintages some vineyards are entirely ecological. They use pomace, compost and stall manure as fertilizers. Application is in late winter and early spring. Overall, they are trying to minimize waste, water and energy consumption.

The Dompropst is the heart of the Graacher vineyard terroir. The “Dompropst” being the dean of the Cathedral of Trier, he had access to the best part of those vineyards in medieval days and the vineyard is now seen as the “Premier Grand Cru” in Graach. The soil is composed of Devonian slate stone with rich clay and alluvial pebbles and stones washed in by the Mosel river.

Vinification: Fermentation is done by natural yeast temperature controlled in traditional old oak casks (Fuder). Bottled 26 April 2016.

Tasting Note: This offers a delicately ripe nose of mango, brown sugar, greengage, and a hint of juicy mint. The wine is juicy and elegant on the palate with elegance in the finish.

Food Pairings: Goes with rich fish dishes, pasta, vegetables, and particularly asparagus dishes. Roasted duck with fruit chutney is an excellent choice.

Residual Sugar: 20.7 g/l

Acidity: 9.0 g/l



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
